

## A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR KEN

Dear friends,

Whenever we say the Apostles' Creed, we confess that Jesus descended into hell. Why in the world do we say such a thing? What's the basis for it? And what does it mean?

Though no book of the Bible fully develops a narrative telling the story of Jesus descending into Hell, sketches of this story are scattered throughout scripture. In 1 Peter 3:18 we hear how Christ descends to make a proclamation to those destroyed in the Noahic floods now sitting in "prison". And later in 1 Peter 4:5-6 that the Gospel comes even to the dead, so that "though they had been judged in the flesh as everyone is judged, they might live in the spirit as God does." In the letter to the Ephesians, Ephesians 4:9, Paul teaches not only that Christ has ascended into heaven, but also that Christ descended below the very depths of the Earth as well, the place the ancients believed Sheol, or Hades, to be.

The early church takes these fragments and pieces together a story. Church Fathers such as Melito of Sardis, Tertullian, and Origen began to weave these elements together relating these scriptures to what takes place on Holy Saturday, the night Jesus spends in the tomb, between his death on Good Friday and resurrection on Easter morning. What happens is that on Holy Saturday, Christ descends into Hell itself, destroying the gates of Hell, and preaching the good news to all the denizens of Hell. Then, though the Fathers disagree on how many follow him, Jesus then leaves Hell taking with him whoever wants to follow. Some Fathers, like Tertullian, taught that Christ came to deliver the "good guys" of the Old Testament, people like Adam and Eve and Abraham and Sarah, who were righteous but lived before Jesus came. Other Fathers, like Origen, taught that Christ destroyed the gates of Hell and freed everyone dwelling

inside- not just the good guys but all the occupants of Hell.

The church continued to develop this theme, and around year 1000, a theologian named Aelfric coined the phrase the "Harrowing of Hell" to describe this belief. To harrow is to rake, or destroy, and Aelfric taught that Christ, in his descent into Hell, destroyed Hell and raked from it the righteous who dwelled there.

This Holy Week, we will celebrate an ancient form of the Triduum. While in the modern church Triduum is celebrated beginning with Maundy Thursday and ending with Easter Sunday, the earliest form of Triduum includes just Good Friday, Holy Saturday, and Easter Sunday. This year, we will follow this ancient pattern, and on Holy Saturday, TPC is putting on a play called "The Harrowing", depicting Christ's descent into Hell, the destruction of Hell, and demonstrating once and for all that what the Psalmist sings is true: "If I ascend to heaven, you are there; if I make my bed in Sheol, you are there." (Psalm 139.) Put it on your calendar!

## **Social Justice Corner**

education classes. Bring Flowers for the cross.

Many years ago, for a multitude of reasons, I decided to leave the denomination of my upbringing. At the time I was working with the severely mentally ill. The denomination with which I was involved was very concerned with mission work, which it defined almost exclusively as overseas evangelism, but failed to demonstrate that they were Christ's hands to the poor, widows, orphans or otherwise marginalized people, including the severely mentally ill, living in Portland, OR. When I made my difficult decision to leave, I began seeking a denomination that placed an emphasis on social justice. The Presbyterian Church USA has long had a reputation for attending to the call of Micah 6:8, which reads: What does the Lord require of you but to do justice and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God.

Throughout His lifetime, Jesus demonstrated in word and deed that we are to care for the sick, the poor and the outcasts; that we are to work for justice. Justice comes in many forms. It can involve giving of money, or withholding of money (boycotts.) It can involve letter-writing campaigns or sign-carrying marches. It can be as simple as making a conscious and informed choice about where your coffee or clothing originates, as to not be a participant in unfair trade practices or sweatshop working conditions.

The following quote comes from: **PEACEMAKING AND SOCIAL JUSTICE IN THE DIRECTORY FOR WORSHIP OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH (U.S.A.)**

God sends the church in the power of the Holy Spirit to share with Christ in establishing God's just, peaceable, and loving rule in the world. God's reconciliation in Jesus Christ is the ground of justice and peace. The church in worship proclaims, receives, and enacts reconciliation in Jesus Christ and commits itself to strive for justice and peace in its own life and in the world (W-7.4001)

Justice is the order God sets in human life for fair and honest dealing and for giving rights to those who have no power to claim rights for themselves. The biblical vision of doing justice calls for

- a. dealing honestly in personal and public business,
- b. exercising power for the common good,
- c. supporting people who seek the dignity, freedom, and respect that they have been denied,
- d. working for fair laws and just administration of the law,
- e. welcoming the stranger in the land,
- f. seeking to overcome the disparity between rich and poor,
- g. bearing witness against political oppression and exploitation,
- h. redressing wrongs against individuals, groups, and peoples in the church, in this nation, and in the whole world. (W-7.4001)

There is no peace without justice. Wherever there is brokenness, violence, and injustice the people of God are called to peacemaking ....in the world where nations place national security above all else, where the zealotry of religion, race, or ideology explodes in violence, and where the lust for getting and keeping economic or political power erupts in rioting or war ..... in communities racked by crime and fear .... (W-7.4003)

I hope to begin a regular column for the Spirit that informs you of opportunities to practice social justice. Many of these will come directly from the denomination, PCUSA. Our denomination has many committees (surprise!) designed to work for social justice. You can read about them at the website: [www.pcusa.org](http://www.pcusa.org). These committees include: The Advisory Committee on Social Witness Policy, The Advocacy Committee for Racial and Ethnic Concerns, The Advocacy Committee for Women's Concerns, The Presbyterian Health Education and Welfare Association, Presbyterians for Addiction Action, Presbyterian Association for Community Transformation, Presbyterians Against Domestic Violence Network, Presbyterian AIDS Network, Presbyterians Affirming Reproductive Options, Presbyterian Association of Specialized Pastoral Ministries, Presbyterian Child Advocacy Network, Presbyterians for Disability Concerns, Presbyterian Health Network, Presbyterian Serious

Mental Illness Network, and others. I would love to hear from any of you about specific social justice issues you'd like to see addressed in future articles. Until then, do good work!

And thanks to directors Jackie Dannemiller and Marsha Steffen for your help and encouragement. The NUMS Group in 2006 worked on a multiple fabric quilt. We also had 6 blankets and 3 quilts delivered Feb. 14.

# TREASURE NIGHT PROGRAM

*Tualatin Presbyterian Church has had an active Treasure program since 2001. Our Treasure Night is usually held the 3<sup>rd</sup> Tuesday of the month.*

Treasure Nights are one of the programs of **Quiet Waters Outreach**. QWO is a non-profit organization dedicated to serving individuals with developmental disabilities, their families and caregivers by providing services to restore their spiritual, physical, emotional, and mental health.

In addition to supporting Treasure Nights, QWO offers family support services (support groups, counseling, etc.), respite care (Martha's Place, a bed and breakfast for those with developmental disabilities, located in Tigard), and life enhancement services (Bible studies, life-skills training, activity nights, etc.). All services are provided free of charge, except for respite care.
