A Refreshed Appreciation for Prayer

There are times when things happen that give one a fresh focus. Currently this has been true for Dorothy and me in regard to trust and prayer. During a few days of uncertainty recently, we were much supported by the following statement.

"When you have come to the edge of the light you know and are ready to step into the darkness of the unknown, faith is knowing that one of two things will happen: there will be something solid to stand on, or you will be taught how to fly." (Author unknown)

Those words were shared with Dorothy and me by Evelyn Challis, Director of Chaplaincy here at Mary's Woods. That sharing was on the occasion of what turns out to have been a minor stroke. Initially the symptoms of headache and unclear vision reminded us of my experience with a pituitary tumor eleven years ago. In a context of fine medical care and strong support from many friends, the tumor actually disappeared spontaneously.

My doctor thought my present symptoms were more likely caused by a small stroke located in the occipital lobe of my brain (which processes vision) and confirmed that with tests. For further diagnosis I was referred to a neurologist who ordered more tests and discovered that there is still some instability in that area. Meanwhile I am functioning all right with reduced activity, little reading, no driving and no hiking, for now. Dorothy is most supportive and naturally carrying extra responsibility.

Many in our TPC congregation, at Mary's Woods, in my hiking group and other friends are praying for us. That feels most helpful. Our own prayer is that my brain will be supported in its natural process of reprogramming and healing and that whatever the future holds that Dorothy and I will be enabled to continue living with confident trust in the under girding divine loving care. Given the state of our world, we are already striving to maintain that sense of over-arching expressed in the quote above.

Prayer is for us all, an amazing support and resource for healing and for living. This further heightens my appreciation for our Prayer Chain, an incredible resource for our lives as a faith community.
