



A Message from Pastor Ken

Dear friends,

So many aspects of life at TPC are fantastic. We just celebrated another wonderful Holy Week. Easter morning found us scrounging for chairs. (Some helpful gremlin even raided my office for seating. If only they had cleaned up my desk, too... ☺) We are blessed by inspired music and art programs. Our fellowship dinners are connecting us on deeper levels. Those who wander down to the adult education room before worship on Sunday will discover some of the most interesting discussions you will hear anywhere in Tualatin.

But, there's a missing piece.

While so many aspects of TPC are great, our ministry to our youth and children does not reflect the value I believe this congregation honestly places on upholding our baptismal vows to them. Some of you remember Nicole Reibe, who two years ago, blessed us as our pastoral resident. During her year with us, Nicole often taught Sunday school and helped with the Sunday evening youth program. After Nicole left to go back to school, the congregation supported opening a new pastoral position focusing on family ministry. Unfortunately, the world economy experienced a near collapse that continues to impact our region and our church. While a series of congregational meetings affirmed the importance of family ministry and the need for additional staffing to support this ministry, we were unable to increase our annual giving enough to make a new hire a reality.

But did Abraham give up when God asked him to leave his country and his family to travel to a strange land? Did Moses shrink in the face of a seemingly undefeatable Egyptian empire? No, we say! And while the Session decided not to hire simply in the hope that our giving would increase to meet the need, the Session did not give up thinking of other ways that we might address this challenge.

This past fall Session elected a small committee and asked them to develop a plan whereby we could afford to hire a part time staff member for family ministry. After a number of meetings, this committee came up with an idea and a way to implement it. What if, instead of trying to raise annual giving, we focused on retiring our mortgage? We currently owe just under \$331,000.00. Every month we make a mortgage payment of a little over \$3,000.00. If we pay off this debt, two good things will happen: we will be debt free; and we will free up \$3,000 each month, which would adequately cover the expenses of adding a part-time new hire.

Wanting to determine the feasibility of retiring this debt, the committee organized two small gatherings last fall and a third gathering early this year to ask members how they felt about this plan to retire the debt and if they were willing and able to make a pledge toward this end. The results were encouraging. Melis and I have offered to give \$15,000 to this effort over a period of three years while maintaining our annual giving at or above our current level. Others have responded positively as well and to date we have received pledges totaling \$157,500.00. We're well on our way!

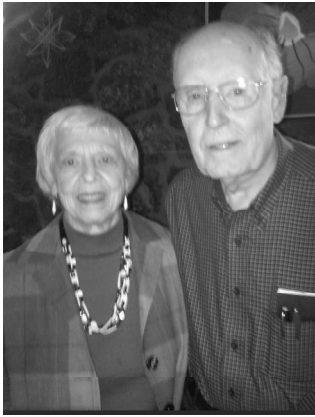
On Sunday May 15th, we will continue our efforts by officially kicking off a three year campaign to retire the debt and provide for our future. I ask you now to begin prayerfully considering how you might be a part of this exciting and bold step.

Think about how it was to see Martin Luther King, Jr. give his famous civil rights address in Washington D.C. and arranging for 22 busloads of people to accompany you. What is it like to be the only white member of a black congregation and to be an active part of the grass roots integration here in the U.S.? Philip Martin can tell you how that feels. He was a part of it.

They have led such interesting lives. She as a special education teacher and mother of two sons, he as a geologist surveying ground water resources prior to receiving his call to the ministry and becoming a father to a son and daughter. When Dorothy and Philip met in San Francisco, one of the deciding factors in establishing their relationship was a backpacking trip with the Sierra Club where they could see each other's strengths in difficult situations.

After they married, they came to Oregon where Philip continued his ministry with the Cascade Presbytery working in New Church Development. We can thank Philip that TPC stands where it is today as he was involved in securing the property for the church. He also became an interim pastor. One place of interest where he served was Roswell, New Mexico. About the UFP incident that Roswell is so famous for, Philip's comment was that what happened there was "quite beyond the realm of his understanding."

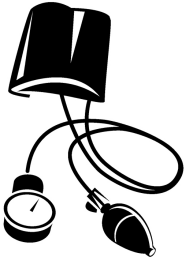

MAY IS NATIONAL HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE EDUCATION MONTH

and this year's theme highlights the threat of uncontrolled hypertension. The National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute (NHLBI) urges Americans: "If Your Blood Pressure Is Not Lower Than 140/90, Ask Your Doctor Why." The NHLBI is part of the National Institutes of Health. NHLBI sponsors the hypertension month effort

with the National High Blood Pressure Education Program (NHBPEP), which it coordinates.

High blood pressure affects about 50 million—or one in four—American adults. Of those with hypertension, about 68 percent are aware of their condition—but only 27 percent have it under control. The reasons for this include not taking drugs as prescribed and/or not taking a medication that sufficiently lowers blood pressure. Hypertension can lead to stroke, heart failure, or kidney damage. To help prevent that, blood pressure must be lowered to less than 140/90 mm Hg (millimeters of mercury). Normal blood pressure is less than 130/less than 85 mm Hg. "We advise Americans to talk about their blood pressure with their doctor," said NHLBI Director Dr. Claude Lenfant. "They should have their blood pressure checked and, if it's high, ask about adjusting their medication and whether they've made the necessary lifestyle changes to bring it to below 140/90."

The lifestyle changes to control blood pressure are: lose weight, if overweight, become physically active; choose foods lower in salt and sodium; and limit alcohol intake. More information can be found at <http://www.nhlbi.nih.gov>.

COOK'S CORNER—Lynn Scroggin

Curried Chicken Thighs

Curried chicken thighs are great to serve with rice and broccoli.

Ingredients:

6 chicken thighs or more
4 T. butter (I use 2 T butter and 2 T olive oil)
1/2 c. honey
1/4 c. mustard
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. curry powder

Directions

Melt butter, then add the rest of the ingredients, except the chicken. Remove skin and excess fat from the chicken. Roll chicken in sauce and put in greased baking dish. Pour remaining sauce over chicken. Bake uncovered at 375 degrees for an hour. (I like to baste every 15 minutes or so.) Makes 6 servings. I make just 6 thighs for my family but there is plenty of sauce for more thighs.

Roasted Butternut Chowder w/Apples & Bacon

Ingredients:

1 butternut squash, peeled, seeded, cut in cubes
1 large onion, chopped
2 large apples, peeled, cored, chopped
4 bacon slices (optional)
1 T minced garlic
Salt and pepper
3 T olive oil
1 T chopped fresh sage or 1 tsp. dried sage
1/2 C dry white wine or water
6 C vegetable or chicken stock or water

Heat oven to 400 degrees. Spread squash, onion, apples, garlic in a deep roasting pan or baking sheet. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and drizzle with oil. Roast until all are tender and browned, approximately 45 minutes. Cook bacon until crisp in separate pan.

Place cooked vegetables and fruit in soup pot including browned pieces from pan. Add sage and wine. Add stock and cook approximately 25 minutes. You can stir and break up pieces, if you wish. Serve with crisp bacon as topping, or without, for a vegetarian meal. Makes 4 servings.
