

Greetings again,
 Welcome to fall! This month with so much going on, I've decided to write a kind of 'pastor's potpourri' newsletter piece touching on a couple of important issues, namely **worship** and **childcare**.

One of the great touchstones of the Reformation is the belief in the priesthood of all believers. Luther and Calvin absolutely got it right when they articulated a view of the church in which all were welcome to participate and lead in worship and not just a privileged few. Indeed, the word liturgy actually comes from the Greek roots meaning "work of the people". However, when it comes to living this out as Presbyterians, we often talk the talk far better than we walk the walk. We are all busy, and it is easy to allow worship and liturgy to become less the work of the people and more just the work of pastors. Your worship committee believes it doesn't have to be like this, and envisions worship with an expanded role for the liturgist including reading, praying, and possibly other ways of leading us all in the worship of God. Your worship committee also knows, though, that a greater role for liturgists will require greater training and support for them as well. And so, this fall as we plan to expand our worship possibilities, we begin by offering a training session on Saturday, November 12 from 9:30 AM to 12:00 PM here at the church led by yours truly. We will work on forming a basic understanding of Reformed worship as well as focus on practical skills such as how to find or write vital and appropriate prayers and how to read and speak for meaning. Open to all, this training will be required for everyone who desires to be a liturgist- if you cannot make this date more will be offered. Please call the office to RSVP or if you have any questions.

And Jesus said: "Let the children come to me, do not try to stop them; for the kingdom of Heaven belongs to such as these." (Matthew 19:14 REB) It is both spiritually and organizationally true to say that churches live or die by how well they care for children. I remember once being somewhat surprised to read that church consultants believe they can determine the overall health of a church by visiting just one room and that that room is *not* the sanctuary. Guess which room they're concerned about --the nursery. That's right- the nursery. While I think it's probably a stretch to say that the whole program at TPC can be summed up by our nursery, it is without a doubt true that no one with young children (people vital to sustaining a congregation) will continue being a part of a congregation that doesn't provide good and safe care for their children.

We at TPC now find ourselves at something of a challenge and an opportunity. Margaret Girardi, who has worked downstairs in our nursery for 7 years, has accepted a new position with Tualatin Elementary School and will no longer be able to continue with TPC. We are so thankful to Margaret for her faithful service with us, and we now turn our thoughts to what lies before us. Our desire is to search for three people who feel called to a ministry of caring for our little ones. We need one person with some organizational ability who will be willing to organize the various child care needs of the congregation. And we are looking for people (at least one must be over 18) within the congregation or without who would jump at the best way to spend time with little ones, have all the fun and then hand them back to their parents. ☺ Please call the office if you are interested or know someone who is interested either in coordinating our child care program or in working for us in the nursery.

The summer is typically a down time for cub scouts. This was not the case this summer, however, for the boys of Cub Scout pack 414!

At the close of the last school year the pack was down to about nine public schooled boys (out of River Grove Elementary). In May, I approached their committee about adding a home schooling den. The committee agreed to add the new den, but couldn't offer a location to meet (the school is closed for the summer). I approached our Session and asked to use the classrooms downstairs. They agreed, and before you knew it, we added over 25 home schooling boys to our pack! Yahoo! In four short months we've seen an incredible number of achievements, segments and other awards given.

We've learned about bicycle safety, citizenship, home security, art, respect, resourcefulness and many other important values. The pack is now nearly 35 boys strong and we've not begun our fall recruiting campaign! None of our achievements would have been possible if the home schooling families hadn't had a place to meet. It's a bit amazing to me that twice a month over 40 scouts and families nestle into the space downstairs to commune, communicate and connect - isn't that what TPC is all about?
