



Dear friends,

My main man, Karl Barth, once told the church we should keep the Bible in one hand and a New York Times in the other. Well, what with college savings plans and retirement accounts and the unprecedented instability in the global financial markets, I've been spending quite a bit of time in the last few weeks following Barth's advice. And I haven't been liking what I've been reading.

Several factors have combined to create a kind of perfect storm in the global markets; a storm that has the potential to reshape life around the world. I heard the best summary of how we got here in a piece reported by Alex Blumberg and Adam Davidson titled "The Giant Pool of Money". Here's a link to the story:

Here's a summary. First, due to a growing world market the amount of money that countries, companies, and institutions have to invest, the giant pool of money, has grown enormously since the year 2000. For hundreds of years this money grew slowly until the year 2000 when it stood at 36 trillion dollars. Now from 2000 to 2006 this number had doubled to around 70 trillion.

So, in a very short period of time money managers found themselves with this vast amount of money to invest, and they looked for investments that are safe, but that would also grow. Now, the place the world used to keep all this money was mainly in U.S. Treasury bonds. These were considered extremely safe, and they provided a small return. However, if you will remember just a few years back, our friend and turtle look alike, Alan Greenspan, decreased the federal funds rate to an absurdly low level due to concern about growth. This left the "giant pool of money" hungry for investments that seemed safe *and* would provide a reasonable return.

Ha-HA! This is precisely the point when big Wall Street banks started buying mortgages and packaging them as what are known as mortgage backed securities, which gives investors the return of a mortgage (about 5-9%), without all the volatility related with home owners. And this was fine, until around 2003 when everyone who could reasonably afford a mortgage had one. And this is the point, friends, when banks started drinking the Kool-Aid.

In 2003 commercial banks on Wall Street, desperate to offer the giant pool of money more mortgage backed securities, started purchasing mortgages without the historic due diligence that ensured a home buyer had

the income and assets to reasonably pay back the debt. First, banks continued to confirm income, but allowed people to simply state their assets- to simply tell the bank how much money they had, in other words. And then, the banks finally allowed what are now known as NINA loans- standing for No Income and No Assets. A person willing to pay a higher interest rate could simply state their income and their assets to a bank, and just like that they had access to an enormous amount of credit.

Unfortunately, you now know the rest of the story. The first problem is that home prices fell. So not only does this diminish the value of the asset behind the asset back securities, but homeowners who depended on their home values to rise started to default on their payments. While the original mortgage backed securities had default rates around 1.5% to 3.5%, these subprime securities are expected to experience inconceivable foreclosure rates upwards of 50%. So now, not only are the mortgages not being paid, but the assets underneath are worth much less as well.

So why does a pastor care about all this? Well I believe this isn't merely a financial crisis. I believe this is a moral and spiritual crisis as well. The story that emerges from this mess is a cancerous sense of individualism in which otherwise sane people willingly set aside their questions and better judgment simply in order to make more money and to purchase things in reality they couldn't afford. And, and I think this is the most alarming aspect of this, people like myself kept to ourselves and simply watched all this going on without saying a word. People like me were comfortable thinking this story was really just about others, not realizing how interconnected we are, and, whether we like it or not, that we are all in this together.

Now did you know at the very core of Reformed theology is the belief that God is not an individual but a community? We all run around with this Gary Larson image in our head of God with a big white robe and a big white beard, but our tradition tells a different story. Our grandmothers and grandfathers in the faith remind us God isn't a single individual, but that God exists as a community of three persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit; creator, redeemer, sustainer. And moreover this community isn't run like a hierarchy with the father barking out orders to the second and third persons, but the church believes the three people live in a state of *perichoreisis*. *Perichoreisis* literally means mutual indwelling, and it refers to how each person of the Trinity flows into and is intimately connected with one another.



And, when we affirm that *we* are made in the image of God, we affirm not our rugged individualism, but our capacity to live in communion with God and with one another. When we affirm we are made in the image of God, we are saying that what happens to our brother and sister happens to me. This is what Paul means when he refers to us as being so connected to Christ and to one another that we actually form one body.

We feel this unity sometimes, don't we? We felt it when the towers fell in 2001, and for a time neighbors reached out to one another and people volunteered for no other reason than they wanted to be part of something larger than themselves. My own family certainly felt this in the last month feeling so much love and support from our church family and from our friends at Intel. And from the sounds of it, this financial crisis not only reminds us how tied we are to one another today, but if the solutions we find aren't successful and our economy continues to slide, we may become far more obviously dependant on one another tomorrow and in the days to come.

Friends, I think the challenge before us will be to make decisions grounded in our faith and not in our fear. These are the kinds of times that make us want to pull back from one another and protect what we have. But even Wall Street is coming to realize what the People of the Street, a translation of the earliest name for the Christian movement, know in the deepest part of ourselves: we stand and fall as one body.

We can start by supporting the upcoming Heifer month at the church. All October long we're going to be learning about the Heifer Project (<http://www.heifer.org/>) and their work in equipping families around the world with the training and animals they need to combat hunger, develop community, and quite literally, to change the world one farm at a time. And if we raise enough money...sigh...yes, yours truly will even kiss a pig. So you *know* I'm committed- are you?

At the dinner, we’ll eat (isn’t that what we always do?) and later, auction off an array of interesting items. Members have donated treasures or employed their time, talent and creativity to make some wonderful items. We’ll also auction off the animals created last month by our youth and other congregational members. Join us for this fun event and help float this boat!

The dinner and auction is just one way you can help support this Mission Committee project. In the narthex, look for the ark with the adjacent animal cards. Grab one of the cards and subscribe to the amount for that particular animal (hint – the water buffalo is slightly more expensive than the chickens). Another way is to take a Heifer calendar and follow the guidelines for periodic contributions (one of its suggestions is to look in your refrigera

tor and donate a nickel for each carrot you see – we hope you have a large bag of baby carrots!). Another way to help is to take one of the Heifer banks and encourage your children to provide ballast for the ark.

Heifer International provides dozens of different species of animals and fowl to people in need around the world. The Heifer Ark is their largest project. An ark launches a boatload of help and hope for hungry people. An ark consists of pigs, camels, water buffalo, guinea pigs, ducks, chickens, oxen, cows, rabbits, donkeys, bees, sheep, llamas, geese and goats. As it was with Noah, the ark is about hope and about a new beginning. Help us provide that hope and a new start to those in need.

Don’t forget, if we reach our goal, Pastor Ken has agreed to gladly (?) kiss a member of the pwaka family in front of the entire congregation. Cast your vote for lipstick or no lipstick on that pig. Don’t miss this opportunity!

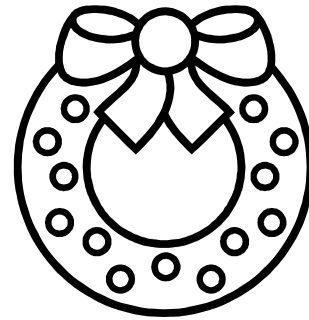
