So...Reformation Sunday or All Saint's Day?

In the past two years I have served you we have celebrated All Saint's Day on the last Sunday of October. Though technically All Saint's Day always falls on the first of November, this has been a wonderful way to remember and honor our grandmothers and grandfathers in the faith. All Saint's Day is the perfect day to remember what the author of Hebrews tells us: that our faith journey is never simply one of "me and Jesus", but we walk surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses.

This year, though, we are celebrating Reformation Sunday rather than All Saint's Day. What's the difference? While on All Saint's Day we remember everyone who has gone before us, on Reformation Sunday we honor the particular genius of the men and women who revitalized the faith- not by creating something novel, but by restoring what had been lost and forgotten.

The four watch words of the Protestant Reformation are *sola gratia* (grace alone), *sola fidei* (faith alone), *sola scriptura* (scripture alone), and *solus Christus* (Christ alone). These words are as important today, as they were back in the 16<sup>th</sup> century.

Grace alone - the keystone and scandal of the Reformation is that we are saved not by our works, but by the grace of God. That is to say, God is not Santa Claus who rewards good little boys and girls and punishes bad little boys and girls. God is the Holy One of Israel made known through the life, death, resurrection, and ascension of Jesus Christ who loves us not because we're good enough, smart enough, and dog gone it people like us- but because in Christ God sees us for who we really are, and not as how we sometimes behave. I say this is a scandal, because we only seem to catch glimpses of this truth- most of the time we believe salvation is up to us. But can you imagine what our relationships would look like if we lived what we say we believe?

Faith alone- Calvin defines faith as "a firm and certain knowledge of God's benevolence towards us founded upon the truth of the freely given promise in Christ, both revealed to our minds and

sealed in our hearts by the holy spirit." The shock of the Reformation is that faith itself is a gift! Faith, from the vantage point of the Reformation, is not a choice *you* make- it is the reassuring trust that *God* has already made a choice for you! It's not that the Reformation tells us our commitment to Christ doesn't matter; rather, the Reformation just reminds us that whatever commitment we have is always a response to God's love, and never the price of admission.

Scripture alone- this is perhaps the most misunderstood facet of our tradition. When we say scripture alone, we are not pitting the Bible against our learning in science or literature. In the Reformation scripture's chief opponent was church tradition. When we cry "*sola scriptura*" we aren't trying to turn the Bible into a bad science textbook; we are saying that the grounds for our decisions in the church are the Bible, and not simply because we've always done things a particular way or because a pastor or bishop barks an order.

Christ alone- the final watchword of the Protestant reformation (*solus Christus*) is the most challenging and comforting of all. Who is the true head of the church? Who leads us? Well, the good news is...it's not a committee. ☺ The true leader, the true head of our church is Jesus Christ- this young radical who broke bread with the luckless, and lived and died for the least, last, and lost. Yet, while it's comforting to know that ultimately Christ's hand is the one guiding us, the great challenge to us is knowing that discerning how TPC should move into the future is never as easy as taking a poll and seeing what actions are the most popular. Indeed, the question always before us is not where we would like to TPC go in the days ahead, but where is Christ calling us? And that's a slightly different question, no?

With the notes of the bagpipes from Reformation Sunday still lingering in my head, I leave you with the great slogan of our tradition: "The church reformed, and ALWAYS reforming!" The real Reformation isn't an historic time period- it stretches out before us today. Our question is are we ready for it?

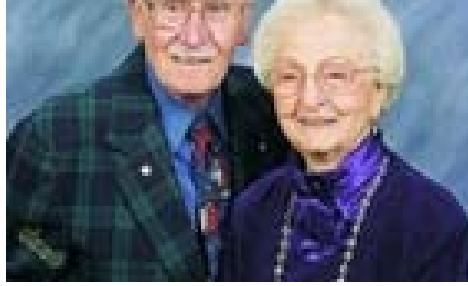
## **\*Worship Journals:**

**In Memory of Glynn Jenovich  
May 18, 1918 – October 15, 2006**

Glynn was born May 8, 1918 in Olympia, Washington to Phillip and Loretta Jenovich. He and I met in high school when we took a drama class together. Glynn borrowed my homework and shared it with his friends. He made me laugh.

We were married in 1939. Glynn was 21 and I was 19. In 1942, Glynn joined the Coast Guard and was stationed in Washington. He was later transferred to the USS General William Black. He made 22 crossings in the Pacific and the Atlantic during WWII. He finally returned home in 1945.

Glynn worked in the wholesale meat trade his entire career, first as a butcher, and then in sales and management. He and I built a house in Tigard in 1950. In 1969, we built a second house next door and have lived there until today. He loved to hunt and fish. Glynn and I loved to dance and we danced every chance we got. Early on our family vacations were spent camping. Later, we traveled to the Holy Land and England. Our family and friends have great memories of the meals we have cooked together.

We have two daughters, Lynn Scroggins and Sherry Nelson, five grandchildren and ten great grandchildren. Glynn and I celebrated our 67<sup>th</sup> anniversary on May 20 of this year. If you asked him what his greatest love was, he would say, "Maxine and the family, all the family." We have been blessed to know this man.
