



A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR KEN

Dear friends,

A couple of weekends ago I was given an extraordinary gift of a weekend in Spokane. No, this wasn't a great gift because I had the first decent night's sleep I've had in weeks (thank you Will and Ella! ☺), although that was a nice perk. It was a great weekend because I gathered with about a hundred other people to learn more about something called the Emergent church, an independent movement attempting to articulate alternatives to the stale liberal-conservative morass the church settles for most of the time. I'll admit I went with a fairly skeptical attitude, but I've come away with a renewed sense of hope for the beautiful things God is doing in the church today.

So what do they believe? How do they worship? And do you have to have vintage clothes and a nose ring to be part of it? These are all good questions, however our fearless leaders told us over and over again they couldn't really give us final "answers" to any of these questions. (All except for the vintage clothes and body piercing- apparently we're free either way. This was a relief to me. After having my wisdom teeth out a while back, I'm really hoping to put off any more close encounters with sharp things for at least a little while.)

Now honestly, while their reluctance to give clear answers was frustrating at first, I think this is what I find most convincing about my time with these good people in retrospect. They consistently refused to reduce what they were doing to easy answers, glib talking points, or 10 steps that you, too, could follow to make your church "emergent" and attract the 18-35 set. No, they talked about paradox and mystery, authenticity, being intentional about the things we do in worship and in our common life, and about how every expression of the church has something good to teach us- whether it be conservative, liberal, Roman Catholic, Eastern Orthodox, Presbyterian, Anabaptist, or what have you.

Doug Pagitt, the pastor of an emerging church in Minneapolis, was one of the speakers I liked the best. In his book entitled Church Re-

imagined he shares twenty three dreams his community came up with for the kind of church they wanted to embody. Let me share just a few with you:

Dream 5: Beauty, art, and creativity are valued, used, and understood as coming from the Creator.

Dream 7: Joy, fun, and excitement are part of our lives.

Dream 18: Christian community is the attraction to outsiders and the answer to questions of faith.

Dream 22: Other churches are valued and supported

Dream 23: People's visions and ideas of ministry come to life

I don't know about you, but I want to be part of a church where creativity is valued. I want to be part of a church where joy is woven into our fabric. And I want to be part of a church where people who may or may not agree with every last tenet of Presbyterianism feel genuinely welcome, honored, and know they can join us in our work and ministry.

On the last day Doug shared with us a slide with a picture of a young woman and then read from an email she had written to him. In her email she shared with him that she was filled with doubt about God, Jesus, and the Bible, but that she loved his church and would it be OK if she kept coming and participating. With this huge grin on his face, Doug's response to this: "Are you kidding me?" And he invited us to imagine being a church where we evaluated people's faith not by their opinions or their ability to make certain public statements, but by their willingness to show up, to care for one another, and to follow the way of Jesus whether or not they've got it all figured out. SESSION ROUNDUP

As one more way of connecting you to what's going on at TPC, here is a quick summary of what happened at the most recent session meeting on Thursday, November 15th.

Session welcomed Abby Britton from Tualatin Valley Preschool (TVP) to share with us how things are going downstairs. Last year we signed a new, three year lease with TVP, and we all agreed that as part of our new lease we should meet with one another. I'm so glad we did this, because we have a great relationship with the preschool and this will only improve the relationship. Abby reported things are going great and we discussed some minor improvements we can make to the space.

We discussed a request made through Mission for TPC to join a network of other churches acting as emergency shelters in extreme cold and heat. The session had a great discussion about this, are supportive of the idea, but want more information before making a final decision.

Karen Stevenson gave us an update on some of the work being done on maintaining the sanctuary. Due to an extremely generous gift made last month, we've been able to replace sound equipment no longer working due to age. Further improvements will await a recommendation from Norm Dannemiller on whether we will replace our damaged HVAC unit (19 years old!) or whether we should simply repair it.

-Finally, Shari Olsen asked for Session's guidance regarding the request from Nursery Director Rob Ayers asking for a second nursery care provider for Sunday mornings. Session agreed that safe and reliable nursery care is critical, and voted to approve starting the hiring process.

Boy Scouts of America and Cub Scouts Walk & Knock Scouting for Food December 1, 2007

The annual Scouting for Food drive is coming up soon! We hope you will participate on the first Saturday in December. Last year Scouts in Oregon and southwestern Washington collected nearly 361,000 pounds of food to benefit local hunger relief agencies. Let's do it again! Scouting for Food kicks off Friday night with Boy Scouts serving dinner for many of our community's homeless people. Saturday morning Scouts will begin going door-to-door asking residents to donate canned and packaged foods for hungry people in our community. The Oregon Food Bank's shelves have been decimated by the recent recalls, so if adults would take a grocery bag to work and ask their co-workers to assist in our efforts, it would be greatly appreciated. Also, remind your volunteers that monetary donations are appreciated; make checks payable to: The Oregon Food Bank. Mike Shiffer of the Schoolhouse Pantry says that there will be volunteers to take donations from 10 AM to 2 PM on Dec 1. The Pantry is located in the portable structure at the old Tualatin Elementary School on Boones Ferry at Sagert. Monetary donations made directly to them help with their budget.

CHRISTMAS TREE RECYCLING

Tualatin based, Boy Scout Troops 35 and 530 will be conducting their annual tree recycling fundraiser again this Christmas Season. Door hangers and/or envelopes with program information, contact names and numbers will be distributed after Thanksgiving. The program is conducted on an honor system, and no door to door solicitation for service is conducted. Tualatin Troops are very active in the community, supporting the Food Pantry, local schools and city programs. The funds raised go directly to the Scouts, and are used for Summer Camp and other Troop activities. In advance we thank you for your support. Social Justice Corner

This time of year is an especially good time to consider how we live out a life of justice when the cry is for consumerism. The question "are you ready for Christmas?" invariably is asking about whether we've completed our purchasing and wrapping process, and little to do with whether we've prepared our hearts to receive the gift of the Christ Child; the Child that shunned all symbols of wealth, status and power to become a helpless infant in a working-class family. Through His identification with the poor, sick, outcasts and marginalized peoples He changed the notion that the Messiah would come with great power to overturn Roman rule. His power was in His love, which led him to identify with those in need and meet them where they were.

At Christmas, we too have abundant opportunities to practice justice and let go of the one of the greatest defining features of our culture, our ability to consume. Now don't get me wrong...I love giving gifts, and truth be told receiving them too. I love seeing faces light up with delight when I really scored with the right gift. However, something in the back of my mind never quits wondering about how we spend at this time of year. In my life, I have no needs....really. I have only wants because all my needs are met. I don't "need" a new sweater---the old one isn't worn with moth holes yet! My shoes may be worn, but the soles are solid. Are all my clothes perfectly in keeping with this year's fashions---no, but does it matter?

I keep wondering, and have not yet been able to get over my own greed and pride to do this, what it would be like to go totally "alternative" in my giving one year. You know, actually buy a water buffalo for a family in the Philippines through Heifer International. Or, maybe buy textbooks for children in Senegal, Africa? How about providing funds to cover nursing home care for AIDS patients or planting a forest in Haiti? All these are options, plus hundred more, that you can access in five minutes on your computer. Try "googling"—a new verb, "alternative gifts." Visit heifer.org or alternativegifts.org or greatgifts.org. From the PCUSA.org, our denominational website, you can enter "alternative gifts" in the search box and find out what the denomination recommends. Or, if you love to shop, visit 10,000 Villages on NW Everett in Portland. While I'm not

going totally alternative this year, I commit to making a start---feel free to ask me about it. How about you? Remember, Jesus tells us that when we care for the sick and the needy and the outcasts, we're caring for Him. Send Him some chickens for Christmas!

I live in Tualatin with my 7-year-old daughter, Sara. Growing up in the Sacramento area, I was a member of the Fair Oaks Presbyterian Church, and was active in the youth group and choir. My sister is married to a Presbyterian pastor. But, since moving to Oregon in 1987, I avoided church, mostly because, like a lot of people, I felt okay with God but differed with "church people" (relatives included). I didn't fit in.

In 2000, I joined a Lake Oswego law firm as an attorney, while I was pregnant and going through a divorce. After several years of raising a child on my own while succeeding in a very unforgiving profession (failure wasn't an option), I was physically, emotionally, and spiritually exhausted, desperate for peace and rest, and compelled to admit that I couldn't carry on alone anymore and needed God's help.

Sometime in 2005 I decided to visit TPC, because I knew I could speak and understand Presbyterian. The first time I came, tears welled when I heard Ken say, "God has already removed from you your guilt and your shame." I realized then how weighed down I was by guilt and shame -- from a failed marriage, from feeling like I was letting my daughter down because earning a living was taking so much of my time and energy, from wanting to do and be so much more than I was--from a lot of things. I was moved to change what I could, and in 2006 I took a leap of faith and opened my own law office. In some ways I'm working harder than ever. But when I need time with my daughter -- or for myself -- I take it. That's a blessing. And it has helped so much to come to a place each week where life waits outside for an hour or so while I'm reminded that I'm loved just as I am, and that I don't have to be in charge all the time. That I also found "church people" who are warm and welcoming has made

me think that maybe I can be a "church person" again, too.

I'd like to tell you about all my interesting hobbies and active social life, but those things are mostly on hold for now. Sara attends Byrom Elementary and is in the second grade. She is taking a beginning jazz dance class, just finished soccer, and will soon move to the next level in her swimming lessons. She is my most important work. For money, I represent local governments (special districts, cities, counties). I am first vice-chair and serve on several committees of the North Clackamas Chamber of Commerce. In addition to practicing law, I teach seminars around the state for local government board members and staff.

Children's Smile

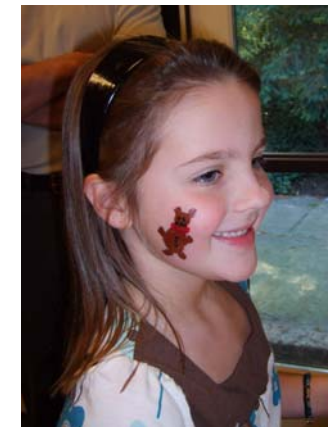
