



A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR KEN

Dear friends,

I'm never quite sure how to feel about the Christmas season. On the one hand I love the crisp, cold mornings. I love the lights already beginning to illuminate our nights. I love going to Lee Farms and cutting our own tree. I love singing Silent Night by candle light. Most of all I love the story of this young, frightened couple who welcome in complete strangers to see their little one even when Bethlehem had been so unwelcoming to them. I love all that. I do.

But, on the other hand, there's also "Momma Got Run Over By a Reindeer". (That song may not have been big in Oregon, but in Texas they played it every three to four minutes on the radio when I was growing up. To this day the very image of Santa's four legged conveyances brings the song to life again in my mind.) There are the endless appeals for us to celebrate God's love primarily through consumption. And, as a pastor, there is a painful irony of knowing that while this season is so full of joy for so many, it is so full of pain for others.

So, I'm always a little ambivalent this time of year. I love this season. And I don't.

And this ambivalence got me to thinking about Paul Tillich, one of the greatest theologians of the 20th century. Tillich was famous for his ambivalence. On the one hand he was a theologian, yet by the end of his life he refused to attend church. On the one hand he wrote that in Christ we saw a model for new humanity, and yet he also wrote that there was more truth in a Cezanne still life than in any picture of Jesus hanging in a museum.

And maybe the greatest tension in Tillich of all? While he did everything he possibly could to rid himself of religious superstition and what he considered empty church practices, no matter where he was in the world or how difficult, he always celebrated a traditional Christmas.

Near the end of his life, when he was more interested in Buddhism than Christianity, his family noted that not a Christmas went by when he didn't put up a tree and light a hundred candles around his home.

And although I'm not entirely sure why he did this, I think it had to do with when he was a young man, a young chaplain, in World War I. Tillich started out as a chaplain with a very conventional, very conservative Christian faith. But what he was taught to believe made little sense on the battlefields of Champagne and Verdun. He was awarded the Iron Cross for risking his life

pulling the wounded from danger, but he lost his faith in the process.

Yet even when he questioned every belief he had once held dear, Tillich was remembered by his comrades for always, no matter how difficult the situation, for always finding a way to help them celebrate Christmas. Whether it was by his scrounging for extra food or finding a way to make little candles, Tillich made sure the soldiers in his charge never missed a Christmas. All this, even when Christmas itself didn't make a whole lot of sense to him at the time.

Maybe what happened is that Tillich sensed that regardless of his ambivalence, Christmas is, in the words of Barbara Brown Taylor, "maybe our last chance to be struck dumb by the simple gift of being human." And maybe Tillich sensed that God cares less about our thoughts than our actions, and while Tillich may not have always believed in Christmas, he kept it nonetheless.

So ambivalent or not, the Christmas season is upon us. And I'm looking forward to keeping it with you. And if you are looking for ways to keep it that have more to do with Bethlehem than Madison Avenue, I commend this Christmas to do list from The Rev. Victoria Safford:

- Mend a quarrel.
- Seek out a forgotten friend.
- Keep a promise.
- Write a love letter.
- Give a soft answer.
- Encourage youth.
- Find the time.
- Listen.
- Examine your demands on others.
- Laugh a little.
- Then laugh a little more.
- Deserve confidence.
- Welcome a stranger.
- Gladden the heart of a child.
- Take pleasure in the beauty and wonder of the world.
- Speak your love. Speak it again.
- Speak it still once again.

But one of our joys was to have a number of you visit this summer. Our last two, Carolyn Hale, and Charlie's sister, just left a couple of days ago. Perhaps the main reason I'm writing you is to let you know that our personal laptop, that is fairly new, got infected by a major virus and worm. We had to shut it down, so consequently we have no computer in our apartment. I'm using Charlie's in his downstairs office, which is shared by several other people. I tried to set up Skype down here, but there is no microphone or speakers, so for those of you who have Skype accounts with paid minutes, you can call us on our land line in the apartment. For over 70 years, Presbyterians have given generously at Christmas to support the unmet need of families who have devoted their lives to the mission of the PC(USA). This offering is shared equally by the Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions, which provides critical assistance to Presbyterian church workers and their families, and Presbyterian-affiliated racial ethnic schools and colleges, which enable students to develop their gifts and find their calling. Take The Stress Out of The Holidays

5. Exercise. Get outdoors, get fresh air, and work out the built-up stress. Dress warmly, wear non-slip shoes and go for a walk.
6. Don't go overboard. Enjoy the special holiday foods that you only get at this time of year, but don't overdo it.

Here's a delicious recipe to start the holidays.

COUSIN SUSIE'S CURRY DIP—Lynn Scroggin
Mix 12 oz cream cheese with 2 tsp curry (I used 16 oz.)

Stir into cream cheese mixture:

- 1/2 C. chopped green onions
- 1/2 C. chopped peanuts
- 1/2 C. raisins

Shape into a ball (or 2) and wrap in Saran Wrap. Before serving, cover ball with Earl Grey Chutney and sprinkle with toasted coconut. Serve with Wheat Thins or other crackers.

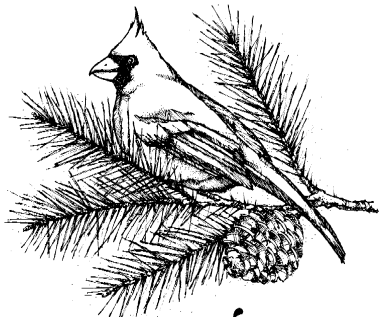
