



## A MESSAGE from Pastor Ken

Dear friends,

Stewardship...the "S" word. To tell you the truth, I grew up thinking "stewardship" was a Presbyterian word for fund raising. Of course stewardship means vastly more than filling out a pledge card.

Stewardship literally refers to the idea that we have been charged with the task of caring for something that is not ours. Biblically, a steward is a highly regarded manager given the difficult assignment of running an estate on behalf of the owner. We are stewards when we realize that the things that matter most, our world, our families, our friends, our health, and our church, just to name a few, do not belong to us. So, fundamentally stewardship means a change of perspective for most of us. Stewardship means seeing the world differently. Stewardship means knowing we are accountable not merely for how well we have looked after ourselves, but how well we have looked after the institutions and others around us on our watch.

Since 2008, every single one of us has been touched by the irresponsible actions on the part of those wanting to make as much money as possible in the short term without regard for the effect on others-whether individuals living beyond their means or wall street banks selling financial instruments they themselves bet against. Recently, some have taken to city parks and college campuses to protest this kind of short-sighted, and selfish greed. I chose not to participate by joining the occupation. I prefer a different kind of protest: I prefer the quiet but alternative lifestyle of living like a steward. I choose the spiritual discipline of constantly challenging the values of the "ownership" society into which I have been raised. I do this by spending my time in ways that make little sense from the perspective of financial gain: I spend time in prayer every day; I spend time with those unlikely to benefit me such as children, seniors, and those with various disabilities; I listen to those in painful situations with often little hope for a solution; and I give away my resources. I give to our congregation, to our campaign to retire our debt, to three children through World Vision, and I give to other institutions and individuals as well. And I will admit- sometimes this does seem a little foolish. But then I remember it only seems foolish if I believe at the end of my days I'm going to regret not having amassed more stuff. And I just don't. I just don't believe that. No one on their death bed laments not having worked more or having piled away more money. We will only regret not loving the people around us better or caring for others more with the resources given us. And since tomorrow really is uncertain- why not live this way today? Why not live like a steward?

Please join me and prayerfully consider making a pledge to TPC today. "We make a living by what we get, but we make a life by what we give away". *Winston Churchill*

## To Clap or not to Clap....

The following article, written by Martha Wilson, first appeared in the Feb. 2011 Spirit. It is reprinted here, with some changes in the final paragraph.

I love TPC! I love how we embrace diversity and are so open to a variety of expression in our faith! We look for ways to allow unique experience and understanding. We are a tolerant and open group.

We are also an affirming group. As both a member of the vocal choir and the director of the bell choir, I can say without hesitation that you give kudos with regularity! I'm so grateful to be a part of a congregation that gives praises liberally! One of the ways you, as a group, say "thank you" is by putting your hands together and clapping. We, who are the musicians of the church, hear that and know you're thanking us and it can be very heart-warming to us. However, it can also be disappointing to us, depending on what we're trying to accomplish with any given piece of music. Here's what I mean...

Our goal, as church musicians, is not to draw the attention to ourselves, it is to put you in touch with an experience of the Holy. Sometimes our music points to God's lighter side: the playfulness and joyfulness found in our relationship to God. This would be a more "bouncy" piece of music, like a gospel number or a bluesy jazz piece. It's the kind that makes you instinctively happy and brings forth a longing to express that happiness. When that upbeat music produces an upbeat worship experience, than an "upbeat" expression, like clapping would be very appropriate. It's your way of saying "I agree, my faith experience is joyful right now."

Sometime, though, we try and take you to a more quiet, reflective place. This kind of music is usually more soft, tender, meditative and is meant to put you into a quiet experience of God. A couple of weeks ago a congregant approached me a few days after worship and told me that the music had moved her to a "thin place." That's a term for moments when the division between our tangible world and the intangible is so "thin" that we experience the Sacred directly. Unfortunately, this congregant reported being jarred out of that reverie by clapping, despite the music having been con-

templative in nature. The clapping was disruptive to her worship experience because it wasn't in keeping with what had preceded it, nor with the experience the choir would hope to invoke in your worship with that particular piece of music. There are times we know we've done a good job ONLY when you don't clap because you're moved to such a reverential space.

Please know that, when we sing, or ring in the bell choir, we're not doing it to point to ourselves, but to point to God. And, when a piece of music calls for it, keep clapping; and when the music draws you to reflection, bask in his presence. Let your response in worship reflect your experience of God through the music.

## November 15, 2011 Session Meeting Highlights

Session approved Dylan Shelton's Eagle Scout proposal to improve TPC grounds. The plan includes re-stripping parking lines, improvements to the meditation garden trail and meditation garden plantings.

Building improvements included enhanced lighting on the west side of the building and repair of a faulty power supply to the smoke detection system. Some water leaks have been discovered and repaired. Water usage will continue to be studied so problems can be isolated and repaired.

A written Annual Report will be distributed at the January Congregational meeting. Committee Reports submitted from Session Elders and other groups will be compiled by the Session Clerk to showcase the activities and accomplishments of 2011.

The congregation vote on amendments to the TPC By-Laws will occur at the March meeting. Before then two opportunities will be provided to learn about proposed TPC By-Law changes as well as the new Presbyterian Book of Order.

The Retire the Debt Campaign Committee reported that \$202,000 has been pledged to date.

Work on Session Retreat goals continues. A demographic report is under study to glean helpful planning information. Questionnaires for adult and youth programs are being prepared. Attendance records for worship, nursery, children and youth programs are being consolidated. A high school retreat is planned for the first weekend in May. Ways to increase visibility of signage are under study.

The discussion of congregational response in worship was continued and the diversity of faith expression was a recurring theme. Martha Wilson's article on clapping in worship was helpful.
